## London VDPs and trainers raise £25K for hospital in Tanzania

FUND-RAISING walk in aid of the resuscitation unit for Musoma hospital in Tanzania was organised by Manny Vasant and Arrif Lalani on Friday June 30. The day started with VDPs, trainers, and advisers from the London Deanery along with other supporters met at St Mary's Church in Putney.

After some lectures by our sponsors (Natwest and MLP), Manny introduced the purpose of the walk. When he visited the Musoma Regional Hospital to plan refurbishment of the dental unit (supported by the Southern Counties BDA in March this year), he had been approached for help by a young man whose sad story was that he had lost his nine-month old baby due to lack of an oxygen machine. Julian Marcus from the Tanzania Development Trust, a registered charity in the UK, showed other projects undertaken by the trust in Tanzania and gave an assurance that 100 per cent of the money raised would be put to use in for the much needed oxygen generators.

After a light lunch, we set off to walk the six-mile route around picturesque

Putney. Each group, armed with a map and directions, set off at 1pm, by which time the sun had risen higher and the temperature was sweltering during the warmest British summer time we have experienced for a while.

The route planned started at Putney Bridge along the River Thames. After one mile the first landmark appeared the Steve Fairburn Obelsik. By this point, those of us wearing flip-flops had wished we had a pair of comfy walking boots! The path progressed to become lined with trees providing a cool and welcome relief from the sun.

The Harrods furniture depository (now site for sought after apartments) was the next landmark. Ironically, this depository was used by our ancestors in the 19th and 20th centuries for safeguarding their furniture before they departed for the colonies such as Tanzania (Tanganyika then). We were on a different mission!
